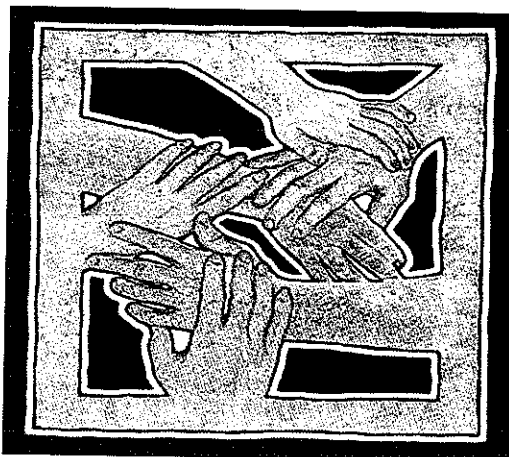
We look forward to a most engaging and provocative day and look forward to sharing it with you!

AND JUSTICE FOR ALL: CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

As social workers we embrace social justice as a core value of the profession. But what does it mean to translate this value into action? How does social justice play out in the everyday challenges of clinical social work practice? The Keynote Presentation, "Social Justice and the Helping Professions: Manifesting the Promise in Practice," addresses the *Just Practice* (Finn & Jacobson, 2008) framework, which was developed in response to the tensions and contradictions experienced by many helping professionals as they work to ensure "best practices" on behalf of their individual, family, group, organization, or community clients. Dr. Finn will explore practice case examples illustrating the application of the *Just Practice* framework within diverse practice settings and with diverse client groups. The presentation includes a reflection on the interplay of the concepts and manifestations of "love" and "justice" with the context of professional practice.

Following the Keynote Presentation, Conference participants will have the opportunity to choose two sessions from a variety of outstanding workshops. All presented by South Florida helping professionals, including educators and practitioners, these workshops will capture and demonstrate theory and skills related to social justice work in multiple social service settings.

The Conference will conclude with a discussion of public policy and social justice advocacy, including the implementation of direct action activities. The Florida National Association of Social Workers (NASW) Director of Government Affairs will lead this presentation. All are invited to end the day at a Wine and Cheese Reception, celebrating our collegiality and solidarity.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Janet L. Finn, PhD

Dr. Janet L. Finn received her B.A. from the University of Montana. She earned her M.S.W. from Eastern Washington University and her Ph.D. in Social Work and Anthropology from the University of Michigan. Dr. Finn currently teaches courses in social work, women's studies and international studies. Her interests are in the areas of community practice, gender, youth, international social work, and social work theory and history. She has been engaged in community-based research with women and grassroots organizations in Montana and in Santiago, Chile. She is the author of numerous articles in social work, anthropology, and women's studies. Her highly acclaimed book, "Just Practice: A Social Justice Approach to Social Work" (2008), co-written with Maxine Jacobson, is now in its second edition. Along with her colleagues Lynn Nybell and Jeffrey Shook, Dr. Finn has recently published "Childhood, Youth, and Social Work in Transformation: Implications to Policy and Practice" (2009). She is presently launching a new project on the social construction of childhood. The project uses childhood as the lens through which to examine questions of labor, immigration, gender, class, ethnicity, and community in a dynamic site of 20th century industrialization and decline. Dr. Finn is committed to linking social work and social justice in her teaching, research, and practice. She has served as the Director of The University of Montana School of Social Work MSW Program since 2005. (The University of Montana Website)

CONSIDERATIONS FOR CONTEMPORARY PRACTICE**

This workshop will explore social justice from an ethical perspective. 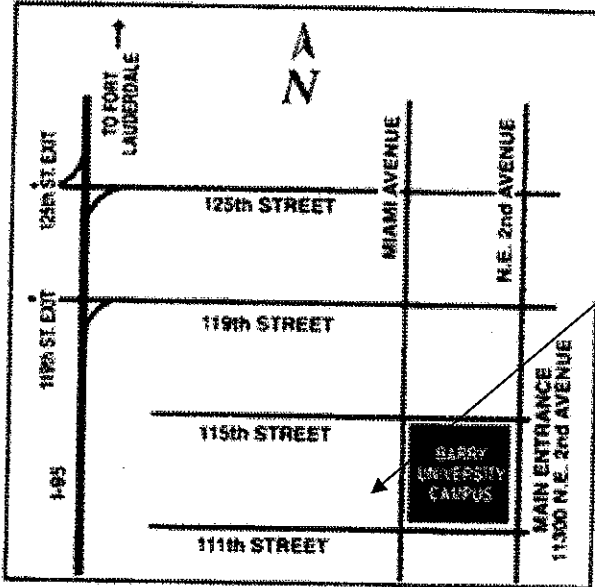
**CONNECTING PUBLIC POLICY AND PRACTICE:
