

Meet Our Alumni:

Sean Cooney graduated last spring in 2012 with his Bachelors of Science in Business Administration with majors in both Finance and Accounting. Sean also served as the Honors Program Student Advisory Chair for the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 academic years. He has graciously given up some of his time this past weekend to answer a few questions we had about his Honors Program experience as well as give a few kind words of wisdom to upcoming HP seniors who are both defending and starting their theses this year.



Q: Can you briefly describe your topic for your thesis and why you chose it?

A: My thesis topic was "Evaluating the Efficiency of Frontier Equity Markets in Caribbean Economies". It took me a few months to settle on this topic and a lot of discussion with my Thesis Advisor, Dr. Morrell. I had originally wanted to do something more correlated to the job that I was going into after graduation. But in the end, I chose this topic because I thought it was interesting, research was trending in this direction, but not fully there yet, and it was also a topic my Thesis Advisor had a background of knowledge in.

Q: Do you have any advice for students that are in the process of defending or starting their theses?

A: If possible, choose a topic that you are passionate about. Also, choose a Thesis Advisor who is willing to dedicate a significant amount of effort to helping you throughout the process. Start as early as possible and put the majority of your effort into the upfront research. If you have done good and organized research and analysis the actual writing of your thesis is the easiest part. If you are defending and anyone on your committee recommended you read a paper, make sure to review your notes on that paper before the defense. Any questions outside the scope of what you wrote in your thesis will likely come from a paper they recommended as this something they probably already read and are familiar with.

Q: Who would you say was the biggest help to you in completing your thesis?

A: Dr. Morrell, my Thesis Advisor was the biggest help to me in completing my thesis. The two of us spent tens of hours reading papers or reviewing them together in his office.



Q: What is your favorite memory of being in the Honors Program?

A: My favorite memory of being in the Honors Program is probably the trip to Orlando for the "America and Rising Powers" conference. This was a very fun trip and excellent conference that featured some high profile political figures such as Paul Wolfowitz, past President of the World Bank.

Q: What would you say the biggest difference between life in college and after college is?

A: In regards to working, I would say the biggest difference is that there are much higher expectations. In regards to life, it is very nice to be able to leave work at the office. In college, you always have homework or projects that you have to work on when you get home. In the working world, once you leave the office you are done for the day.

Q: Where are you currently working? What are you responsible for?

A: I am currently working at Dundee Capital Markets ("Dundee"). Dundee is an Independent Canadian Financial Institution. I work in the Corporate Finance department as an *Energy Investment Banking Analyst*. I do a lot of valuation work on companies and transactions. My department is in charge of helping Oil & Gas companies raise money for projects and to provide financial advice on whether capital markets related transactions are advisable (such as Mergers and Acquisitions).


Submissions Wanted
